PRESIDENT'S REPORT

For thirty-five years, I've had the pleasure of working at Seminole State College. In that time, I've seen so many changes in the technology we use, I've taken pride in the buildings we've constructed, and I've weathered my share of trends. But one thing remains steadfast: our team puts students first in everything they do.

In the past year, we've created a Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Task Force, where faculty, staff and students work together to improve the educational experience for students of every sex, ethnicity and creed.

We've taken steps to ensure students on campus feel safe with a new, state-of-the-art alert system.

We've provided a remote healthcare option for full-time employees and students at no cost to individuals with last fall's telemedicine imitative.

We've installed new washing and drying machines in our dorms for student use.

We've seen our Foundation support our sports teams and community with the construction of the Brian Crawford Memorial Sports Complex, which will serve as the home of Trojan baseball and soccer and play host to a number of tournaments. The complex also features an adaptive field for those with special needs, because when everyone can play, everyone wins.

Thanks to these changes and the hard work of our faculty and staff, we're seeing a strong boost to our enrollment. At the moment of publication, we're seeing a level of enrollment that exceeds the year before the COVID-19 pandemic affected our lives.

With the pandemic came what many have deemed the "Great Resignation." Our institution was not immune to many changes in personnel, but I'm happy to report that the churn has stabilized. We're confident in the talent of our new employees and excited to see how they'll further improve the experience of our students.

I'm also proud to say that our Board of Regents approved our proposal for a 5% salary increase for all employees this June. This is the largest across-the-board salary increase we've had at SSC in more than two decades.

I also want to express my gratitude to the ongoing commitment and dedication to SSC by our Regents, Trustees, alumni, parents and friends.

In all my time at this College, I've never been more optimistic of its future

As you turn the pages of this annual report — whether you're a prospective student, a community supporter or an employee — I hope you'll share in my optimism. I'm so proud of what we've accomplished in the last year and can't wait to see what comes next.





SSC offers 18 transfer degree programs. These high quality programs allow students to complete their first two years of college at an affordable cost and then take their progress with them to the university of their choice.


SSC also offers five applied science associate degrees that are designed for immediate workforce entry following graduation.

On the evening of May 4, Seminole was hit by an EF-2 tornado that spanned a mile wide with winds consistently reaching 125 miles per hour. Homes and downtown businesses were heavily damaged and more than 12,000 people in the region were left without power. The tornado occurred two days before the College's scheduled Commencement Ceremony. Campus leadership decided to postpone the ceremony, and lend a hand with the relief effort.


Student Support Services Hosts Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Events
