Board of Regents Approves Employee Raises

The Seminole State College Board of Regents approved a salary increase for all full-time employees, alongside the budget for the upcoming fiscal year at their meeting on June 15, 2023. Following a directive from the state legislature and the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education related to new funding this year, faculty received significant increases in pay with specific emphasis on positions in STEM, Health Sciences and other high-demand competitive job market areas. While the new funds for higher education institutions are earmarked for faculty pay increases, SSC's budget for the upcoming year also included a three percent increase for all full-time professional and classified staff. The raises will be implemented with no increase in student tuition.

Additionally, the state legislature approved a measure that increases pay for all of our instructors with an emphasis on those teaching in high-demand fields.





The SSC women's soccer team won their fourth consecutive NJCAA Regional II tournament in a 5-2 victory over Northern Oklahoma College at the Advance Soccer Complex in Enid on Oct. 29. The team earned their bid for the National Women's Soccer Championship in Evans, Georgia. The team was eliminated after losses to Iowa Western Community College and Polk State College. They finished the season with a win-loss record of 18-4.


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Former Belles Basketball Coach Featured in Documentary about History of Women's Basketball

Jasmine Moran (May 7, 1934 - March 5, 2022)

Jasmine Moran and her husband, Melvin, demonstrated support for the College over the years in numerous ways – from offering political support of the institution to providing scholarships for nursing students and financial support for virtually every endeavor undertaken to improve the educational opportunities offered to our students. Their influence was a catalyst for the growth and development of the College.

Enoch Kelly Haney (*Nov. 12, 1940 - April 23, 2022*) Throughout his time in the Legislature – serving as a State Representative, Senator and Chair of the powerful Appropriations Committee – as well as in tribal government, Enoch Kelly Haney was a strong friend and supporter of Seminole State College.

The Haney Center carries his name as a tribute to his efforts to bring funding to SSC. His incredible talent as an world-renowned artist enhances our campus with paintings and sculptures that provide a strong tie to our Native American heritage.

His leadership had an immeasurable impact on our college, employees and students.



Kenneth Henderson (July 7,1946 - Nov. 6, 2022)

Former SSC Regent Kenneth Henderson and his wife, Rose, were largely responsible for the creation, landscaping and statuary around campus ponds in Henderson Park. They assisted with numerous other efforts, including the donation of a bus – to help the institution, our students, faculty and staff.

Mr. Henderson was also a great benefactor to the community. He was a former president of the Seminole Chamber of Commerce and was recognized as Citizen of the Year. His impact on our community, campus and students will be felt for generations.
