Chamber of Commerce Honors Two Employees

Two Seminole State College employees were recognized for their hard work and dedication during the monthly Seminole Chamber of Commerce Forum on Feb. 9. Assistant Professor of Mathematics Dr. Ricky Streight was honored as "Faculty Member of the Month" and Admissions and Record Specialist Jessica Guinn as "Staff Member of the Month."

The Seminole Chamber of Commerce Education Committee, along with the Lions Club and Kontoor-Wrangler, recognize SSC employees several times during Forum each year. Individuals are nominated from across the campus and chosen by SSC administrators to receive the honor.

Dr. Streight has worked for SSC at two separate stints of time, totaling 16 years. He served from 1986-2000, first as an instructor and later as an administrator. He returned 21 years later in 2021 to serve as a full-time Assistant Professor of Mathematics. He presently teaches the calculus series, differential equations and also develops and teaches courses in computer science.

He received his bachelor's degree in Science at the University of Central Oklahoma. He holds four master's degrees: Strategic Studies from the US Army War College, Computer Science from West Coast University, Data Analysis from Western Governors University and Mathematics from Indiana State University. He received his doctorate in Higher Education at the University of Oklahoma.

Dr. Streight is actively involved in the Military Officers Association, the Re-

SSC Holds Disaster Training Event for Nursing

Seminole State College held a disaster training event for nursing students on Feb. 22 inside the Enoch Kelly Haney Center on campus.

Students participated in a training module designed to help them understand what qualifies as a disaster, how to triage patients, manage resources and how to work with other agencies to access quick medical care. Before the hands-on training, students attended a lecture about incident command, treating patients and communication techniques in a time of crisis.

Following the lecture, the nursing students were able to put their disaster response skills to the test during a simulation drill, where students responded to the aftermath of a bombing. The loading bay of the Haney Center served as the site of the incident. Students took on different roles. Some students took on the role of victims with various injuries, while other students were asked to perform search and rescue, triage patients and tend to their medical and psychological needs.

"Disaster training is becoming more and more important. We are proud of our nursing students who embrace the philosophy that nursing is an intricate part of any successful disaster response," Crystal Bray, SSC Nursing Program Director, said. "In the future, we hope to work with area hospitals, Emergency Medical Services and Police to expand the training for our nursing students, as well as, area healthcare professionals and response teams."

Tenure Granted to Two Faculty Members at SSC Board Meeting

The Seminole State College Board of Regents granted tenure to two faculty members, approved an increase to room and board rates and approved a resolution to support the current law regarding firearm restrictions on college campuses at their meeting on Feb. 16.

During her report to the Board, President Lana Reynolds discussed campus events, personnel changes, campus maintenance projects and legislative activities.

With the first two item on the agenda, the Board granted tenure to Associate Professor of Mathematics Emily Carpenter and Associate Professor of English Dr. Andrew Davis. Faculty considered for tenure must show evidence of quality performance in teaching, scholarship and service. Applicants must be employed full time by the College for at least five years and submit a portfolio showing evidence of their performance, student feedback and assessment results. Both Carpenter and Dr. Davis were recommended for tenure by Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Amanda Estey.

Carpenter received both her bachelor's degree in Elementary Education and her master's degree in Teaching, Learning and Leadership with an option in Special Education from Oklahoma State University. She is a National Board-certified teacher with 13 years of K-12 teaching experience. She has worked at SSC full-time for seven years and served the College as an adjunct for one year prior to that. She currently serves as Chair for the STEM division.

Dr. Davis received his bachelor's de-

gree in English from Connecticut College, his master's degree in Gender and Cultural Studies from Simmons College and a doctorate in English from Oklahoma State University. He has worked at SSC for five years. In addition to teaching, he supervises the Writing House, a tutoring space for composition students. He is also the Phi Theta Kappa honor society advisor.

Next, the Board approved an increase in room and board rates for the 2023-2024 academic year. Moving forward, the \$100 deposit for campus housing will be non-refundable. The rising cost of food and the need for continued maintenance and improvements in the residence halls drove the request. SSC has not increased the rates since 2015. With the last action item on the agenda, the Board approved a resolution supporting current restrictions on firearms on campus. The resolution reads: "The members of the Seminole State College Board of Regents support maintaining the current law regarding weapons on campus, in which the President has the sole discretion to allow individuals to carry weapons on campus when the individual circumstances warrant it."

Similar resolutions have been approved by the College's Professional Staff Council and the Student Government Association, as well as local law enforcement. Other SSC employee organizations are considering their own resolutions of support. Copies of these resolutions will be provided to the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education and shared with legislators to combat any proposed changes in the current law.

On the consent agenda, the board ratified an emergency purchase to replace a boiler that controls the heat in the Seminole Nation residence hall. The boiler, installed in 2007, is obsolete and parts are unavailable. The Board also approved a program modification to an associate of arts degree.

Board members present at the meeting were: Chair Ryan Pitts, Bryan Cain, Marci Donaho, Kim Hyden, Curtis Morgan and Robyn Ready. The next meeting of the SSC Board of Regents is scheduled for Thursday, March 23, 2023.

State Farm Makes Donation to SSC's Laptop Loan Program

State Farm Insurance recently donated 25 laptops to Seminole State College's laptop loan program. Seminole State Farm Agent and SSC Educational Foundation Trustee Darren Frederick identified the corporate grant program for the College and assisted with the application, resulting in the donation of the devices.

The laptop loan program, which launched in 2020, allows students to check out laptops on a semester-by-semester basis through the Boren Library on campus. To be eligible to receive a laptop, students must be enrolled in at least six credit hours. Students may recheck laptops for up to one calendar year if they are consistently enrolled in at least six hours. After the one-year point, students will be able to reapply for the program. All laptops are in good condition and include a charger.

"We are so thankful for the generosity demonstrated by State Farm. This partnership between a private business and our public institution will directly benefit our students.
