# AI EXPERT EXPLORES FACT VS. FICTION IN CAMPUS TALK AT SSC



Dr. John Hassell, Associate Professor of Software development at the OU Polytechnic Institute and SSC alumnus, spoke on the Jeff Johnston Fine Arts Auditorium stage during his presentation "AI Myths: A Clear Look at Artificial Intelligence" on April 23. Students, community members, faculty and staff attended the event, which was sponsored by the SSC STEM Division. Hassell's talk explored common misconceptions about AI, including the ideas that it is conscious, unbiased or a cure-all for complex problems. He also discussed the differences between predictive and generative AI and emphasized the importance of data quality and human oversight.

# SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE TO DELIVER KEYNOTE AT SSC'S 92ND COMMENCEMENT

Seminole State College will hold its 92nd Commencement Ceremony on Friday, May 9 at 10 a.m. in the Raymond Harber Field House on campus. The event will recognize students completing coursework requirements for their degree programs.

Oklahoma Speaker of the House Kyle Hilbert will serve as this year's keynote speaker. Hilbert represents House District 29, which includes parts of Creek and Tulsa counties. At age 30, he is the youngest Speaker in Oklahoma history and only the second Republican Speaker under 31 nationwide since 1873.

He earned both his bachelor's degree in agribusiness and a master's degree in business administration from Oklahoma State University where he served as Student Government Association President. During his eight years in the House, Hilbert has authored more than 40 bills signed into law. Notable legislation includes the DRIVE Act, which modernized transportation funding and the Redbud School Funding Act, which allocated marijuana tax revenue to underfunded school districts.

Before his speakership, Hilbert held leadership roles including Speaker Pro Tempore and Vice Chair of the Appropriations and Budget Committee. He resides in Bristow with his wife Alexis and their two daughters.

The ceremony will begin with an invocation by SSC Regent Bryan Cain, followed by a welcome address from SSC President Lana Reynolds. Dr. Bill Knowles, Vice President for Academic and Student Affairs, will present the de-

gree candidates and President Reynolds will confer the degrees.

Due to venue capacity concerns, this year's event will require tickets for entry into the Field House. Overflow seating will be available on a first-come, firstserved basis in the Jeff Johnston Auditorium. The ceremony will be livestreamed in the overflow area and on the College's official YouTube page.

Graduates of the Nursing Program will also participate in a Pinning Ceremony at 12 p.m. in the Utterback Ballroom, located in the Enoch Kelly Haney Center.

Campus offices will be closed to the public on the morning of May 9 to allow staff to assist with commencement preparations. The SSC Bookstore and The Flower Box will have pop-up shops on site before and after the event. Offices will reopen at 1:30 p.m.

# EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION'S ANNUAL SPRING BANQUET DRAWS LARGE CROWD

The Seminole State College Educational Foundation hosted its 30th Annual Spring Recognition Banquet on Thursday, May 1 in the Utterback Ballroom of the Enoch Kelly Haney Center. A crowd of 450 guests filled the venue, and the event raised just over \$60,000 making it the most successful banquet in the event's history.

The banquet serves as a major fundraiser and recognition event, honoring alumni, employees and students. This year, Phil Johnson and Karen Romine were inducted into the SSC Alumni Hall of Fame. The Distinguished Service Award was presented to longtime SSC administrator Dr. Brad Walck.

Phil Johnson, who finished his time at SSC in 1989, currently serves as the State Director of the Oklahoma Supreme Court Alternative Dispute Resolution System. Over the course of his career, he has overseen conflict resolution services in all 77 counties in Oklahoma and mediated more than 3,000 cases.

Karen Romine, a 1999 graduate, has served as the Clinical Educator at SSM Health St. Anthony Hospital in Shawnee since 2008. She has worked in emergency, outpatient and acute care settings, and previously taught nursing at SSC.

Dr. Brad Walck, who retired from SSC in 2013 after 22 years of service, received the Distinguished Service Award. He held several roles at the College, including Vice President for Student Affairs and Head Women's Basketball Coach.



# SSC BASEBALL AND SOFTBALL TEAMS BEGIN POSTSEASON PLAY



The SSC softball team, ranked No. 1 in the Region II bracket, will face No. 8 seed NOC-Enid in their opening game of the NJCAA South-Central District Tournament on Wednesday, May 7, at 4 p.m. in Piedmont, Oklahoma.

Seminole State College's baseball and softball teams are set to compete in their respective NJCAA Division I postseason tournaments this week. For updates, brackets and live stream links, visit sscok. edu.

The SSC softball team, ranked No. 1 in the Region II bracket, will open play in the 2025 NJCAA South-Central District Tournament on Wednesday, May 7, at 4 p.m. against No. 8 seed NOC-Enid. The double-elimination tournament will be held at Piedmont High School in Piedmont, Oklahoma, and continues through Saturday, May 10.

The Trojans enter the tournament with an overall record of 34-10, including a 22-2 mark in conference play. The team is currently riding a 20-game win streak, thanks to a strong offense (.351 batting average, 296 runs scored, 42 home runs) and steady defense. The tournament winner will advance to the NJCAA DI Softball World Series in Yuma, Arizona, May 19-24.

SSC will host the NJCAA Region II

Division I Baseball Tournament at the Brian Crawford Memorial Sports Complex in Seminole, Oklahoma, May 8-11. This marks the second consecutive year SSC has hosted the tournament.

The SSC baseball team, who hold the No. 1 seed, will face the winner of Game One (Connors State vs. Rose State) at 7 p.m. on Thursday, May 8. SSC enters the postseason with a 33-18 record and has had a strong showing at the plate this season with 46 home runs and 405 runs scored. The Region II champion will advance to the South Central District Championship, scheduled for May 16-19.

Local support has once again been integral to hosting the tournament. SSC's Business and Industry Director Danny Morgan has coordinated with the City of Seminole, local banks, and the Chamber of Commerce to organize volunteers and logistics.

The event, themed "Be More Employable," was organized in partnership by SSC's Business and Industry program, the SSC Boren Library's Career Center, and the College's federally-funded Student Support Services, Upward Bound, and Talent Search grant programs.

Local employers were invited to share their expertise, offering students a chance to refine their resumes, improve networking skills and participate in up to five mock interview simulations. Students heard from speakers about the importance of resume writing, then rotated through interview stations for hands-on practice and personalized feedback from professionals.
