SEMINOLE STATE COLLEGE BOARD OF REGENTS REGULAR MEETING

June 9, 2025

I. Call to Order

The Seminole State College Board of Regents' regular monthly meeting was called to order at 1:00 p.m. in the Board Room of the Enoch Kelly Haney Center.

II. Roll Call of Members

Roll call was conducted. Regents present were Curtis Morgan, Marci Donaho, Robyn Ready, and Bryan Cain. Regent Ryan Franklin and Regent Teresa Burnett were absent.

III. Introduction of Guests

President Reynolds introduced administrators and staff present at the meeting.

IV. Minutes

There being no additions or corrections to the minutes of the regular meeting held May 15, 2025, Regent Donaho made a motion to approve the minutes as presented. Regent Cain seconded the motion. Roll call was as follows: Donaho, yes; Ready, yes; Cain, yes; Morgan, yes.

V. Communications to the Board

Financial Report – Vice President for Finance, Grants, and Enrollment Melanie Rinehart presented a review of the College's revenue and expenses through May 31, 2025. Regent Cain made a motion to approve the Financial Report as presented. Regent Ready seconded the motion. Roll call was as follows: Donaho, yes; Ready, yes; Cain, yes; Morgan, yes.

VII. President's Report

<u>Personnel Update:</u> President Reynolds discussed personnel changes, including the hiring of Butch Cantrell, Assistant Professor of Nursing; Paul Smith, Assistant Professor of Social Science, Dr. Brenda Prochaska, Assistant Professor of Social Science; and Dr. Alexus Thomas, Director of Clinical Education – PTA.

Campus events and recognitions:

- The SSC Business and Industry department hosted a natural remedies community course.
- Upcoming Business and Industry events include: Barbara O'Neil Live and Kids on Campus
- The SSC Administrative Council is hosting a luncheon for all Classified Staff with the topic being "It's a Jungle In Here: Understanding Our Animal Personalities"
- A grant in the amount of \$25,000 has been received from The Teagle Foundation this grant will support the Learning for Living Initiative
- New Regent Mona Adkisson attended her Regent orientation on June 3rd
- President Reynolds showed the Regents a Year-In-Review video that highlighted the events throughout the year at SSC

• Regents reviewed the Institutional Profile of SSC prepared by OSRHE

Esports Presentation: NASNTI Director Kay Wallace and NASNTI Computer Science Specialist Alecia Bailey presented the Board members with information about the "World of Esports at Seminole State College." This program will begin in Fall 2025.

VIII. Business

A. <u>Consider approval of a \$2 per credit hour increase in tuition</u> - President Reynolds discussed a proposed increase in tuition for FY26 in the amount of \$2 per credit hour. She said that in consideration of flat funding and increased operational costs, she is proposing a \$2 per credit our increase in tuition to cover those costs. This would be a minimal increase of less than 2% and this is the first time an increase has been proposed since 2022. President Reynolds recommended approval of the increase in tuition. Regent Donaho made a motion to approve the \$2 per credit hour increase and Regent Ready seconded the motion. Roll call was as follows: Donaho, yes; Ready, yes; Cain, yes; Morgan, yes.

B. <u>Consider approval of increasing the Safety Fee to \$5 per credit hour</u> - President Reynolds discussed a proposed increase in the Safety Fee from \$2 to \$5 per credit hour. She stated that the funds raised from this fee increase would help the College recruit and retain qualified officers and provide additional equipment for the SSC Campus Police Department. President Reynolds recommended approval of this fee increase. Regent Cain made a motion to approve the Safety Fee increase from \$2 to \$5 and Regent Ready seconded this motion. Roll call was as follows: Donaho, yes; Ready, yes; Cain, yes; Morgan, yes.

C. <u>Approval of the FY26 Educational and General Budget</u> – Vice President Melanie Rinehart presented the Board with a copy of materials for the FY26 budget for review. She highlighted several aspects of this year's budget including information about appropriations history, revenue history, expenditure history and expenditures by function and object. President Reynolds recommended approval of the FY26 Educational and General Budget. President Reynolds commended Vice President Rinehart and her staff. Regent Cain made a motion to approve the FY26 Educational and General Budget as presented, and Regent Donaho seconded this motion. Roll call was as follows: Donaho, yes; Ready, yes; Cain, yes; Morgan, yes.

IX. Special Presentation

On behalf of the Regents, President Reynolds made a special presentation to Seminole State College Board of Regent Bryan Cain who completes his service as Chair in June.

X. Adjournment

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at approximately 2:00 p.m.

BUSINESS TRANSACTIONS WITH COLLEGE

No member of the Board shall be employed upon any work to be performed in connection with Seminole State College, nor shall any member of said Board enter into any contract or business transaction involving a financial consideration with Seminole State College. [See Section 171, (b) of the Higher Education Code.]

OPERATING PROCEDURES - BYLAWS

The Board shall adopt and publish an official set of Bylaws in which the operating rules and procedures of the Board are set forth. The Bylaws should contain the dates and procedures for electing Board officers; the official duties of such officers; the regular meeting dates of the Board and procedures for calling special meetings; the official rules of order which shall govern the meetings of the Board; arrangements for keeping the official minutes of the Board; and other policies, rules, and regulations relating to the conduct of the Board's official business. The Bylaws should be kept current and should be published periodically.

BYLAWS AND RULES OF PROCEDURE FOR THE SEMINOLE STATE COLLEGE BOARD OF REGENTS

I. Organization of the Board

A. At the first official meeting in July of each year, the Board shall elect from among its members a Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Secretary.

To serve as chairman of the board, the regent have completed (if required) the Regents Education Program required by state statute, and be elected chairman at a public meeting of the board of regents by a majority vote of board members at a meeting for which a quorum has been declared.

The office of vice chairman will normally, unless otherwise specified by a majority of the board, be filled by the regent whose term will end prior to other members of the board exclusive of the chairman.

The office of secretary will normally, unless otherwise specified by a majority of the board, be filled by the regent whose term will next end after the vice chairman's.

Anti-Hazing Policy and Procedure

I. Justification and Statement of Policy

Seminole State College (SSC) is committed to fostering a safe, respectful, and inclusive educational environment where all students can thrive free from harassment, intimidation, and abuse. Hazing, in any form, is antithetical to the values of SSC and is strictly prohibited. This policy applies to all students, student organizations, athletic teams, clubs, and any other groups affiliated with Seminole State College, whether on or off campus. Therefore, hazing is unacceptable and a violation of College policy. In addition, it is against federal (<u>Stop Campus Hazing Act</u>) and state law (<u>TITLE 21, SECTION 1190 OKLAHOMA STATUTES–</u><u>HAZING</u>). This document outlines the College's policy against Hazing, reporting mechanisms, investigation of reports, enforcement of violations, and prevention/awareness programs.

II. Scope

This policy applies to all Students, Student Athletic Teams, members of Student Organizations, and advisors to Student Organizations.

III. Definitions

1.

- A. Annual Security and Fire Safety Report a report containing statistics of Clery Crimes and certain fire safety statistics for the three most recent calendar years, as well as College policy statements and procedures addressing campus security and fire safety.
- B. Hazing any intentional, knowing, or reckless act committed by a person (whether individually or in concert with other persons) against another person or persons regardless of the willingness of such other person or persons to participate, that:

a. is committed in the course of initiation/admission into or maintenance of membership in a student organization and athletic team; and

b. violates local, federal, or state criminal law or causes or creates a reasonable risk, above the reasonable risk encountered in the course of participation in SSC activities or the student organization's activities, of physical or psychological injury.

Examples of Hazing consistent with federal and state law are provided below.

- C. Student individuals who have been notified of their admission to SSC and/or who are matriculated, enrolled or registered in any SSC academic program or activity.
- D. Student Organization any organization (such as a club, varsity or junior varsity athletic team, club sports team, or Student government) in which two or more of the members are Students enrolled at SSC, whether or not the organization is established or recognized by SSC.

IV. Policy

1.

A. General Prohibition and Examples

Hazing is prohibited. Examples of Hazing include, but are not limited to:

- whipping, beating, striking, branding, electronic shocking, placing of a harmful substance on someone's body, or similar activities;
- causing, coercing, or otherwise inducing sleep deprivation, exposure to the elements, confinement in a small space, extreme calisthenics, or other similar activity;
- causing, coercing, or otherwise inducing another person to consume food, liquid, alcohol, drugs, or other substances;
- causing, coercing, or otherwise inducing another person to perform sexual acts or to endure brutality of a sexual nature;
- any activity that places another person in reasonable fear of bodily harm through the use of threatening words or conduct or an activity that creates a reasonable likelihood of bodily injury;
- any activity that adversely affects the mental health or dignity of an individual;
- exclusion from social contact or conduct that could result in extreme embarrassment; and
- any activity that induces, causes, or requires another person to perform a duty or task that involves a criminal violation of local, state, tribal, or federal law.

Hazing is considered a violation of the Student Code of Conduct and will be administered in accordance with the code provisions. Consent is not a defense to hazing. That the conduct was sanctioned or approved by the student organization is also not a defense.

For Students, being in the presence of a violation of hazing without reporting it could be considered a violation of applicable sections of the student code of conduct. For employees, presence without reporting may violate the Standards of Conduct and other applicable policies and lead to discipline, up to and including termination.

B. Reporting and Investigation of Hazing

SSC encourages all members of the College community who believe that they have witnessed, experienced, or are aware of conduct that constitutes hazing in violation of this policy to report the violation to Vice President for Academic and Student Affairs. Individuals may also make reports through the online Hazing Report Form. Investigations will occur as outlined in the SSC Student Handbook.

Amnesty: In order to encourage reporting of hazing, the College will extend amnesty from Student conduct allegations and sanctions to parties and witnesses for minor violations of the alcohol and drugs policies (e.g. underage consumption of alcohol, public intoxication, and possession or ingestion of illegal drugs) for reporting parties, witnesses, or respondents where such disclosures are made in connection with a good faith report or investigation of hazing or retaliation. This provision does not apply to more serious allegations such as physical abuse of another or illicit drug or alcohol distribution that contributed to the commission of a policy violation.

Retaliation and Interference: The College also considers retaliation against parties and witnesses to be a serious violation and will investigate and hold accountable any student found to have retaliated against another student as a result of that student's reporting of, or participation in an investigation of, Hazing. Interference in an investigation under this policy by students or student organizations are also subject to sanctions under the Student Code of Conduct.

Disciplinary Sanctions: Student organizations found to be in violation of this policy may face sanctions ranging from a warning to a loss of status as a recognized student organization. Individuals found to be in violation of this policy may face sanctions ranging from a warning to suspension and being expelled from the College.

C. Prevention and Awareness Programs

The College will offer campus-wide prevention programming designed to reach all members of the College community which addresses:

- 1. this policy;
- 2. how to report Hazing;
- 3. information about the College's Hazing response process;
- 4. any applicable state, local, or tribal law; and
- 5. primary prevention strategies.

Requests for training can be made to the Vice President for Academic and Student Affairs.

D. Campus Hazing Transparency Report

As required by the Stop Campus Hazing Act, the College will publicly report, in summary form, findings concerning any recognized student organization found to be in violation of the College's Student Code of Conduct related to hazing. Reports of hazing policies and statistics of hazing violations shall also be published in the Annual Security and Fire Safety Report.

E. Criminal Enforcement

Hazing is a violation of state law and may lead to criminal or civil penalties. Individuals convicted of this law shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and may be punishable by imprisonment not to exceed ninety (90) days in the county jail, or by the imposition of a fine not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00), or by both imprisonment and fine.

TITLE:

Student Location Policy

Purpose:

In accordance with the U.S. Department of Education disclosure requirements, Seminole State College (SSC) records the location of prospective and current students. SSC uses a student's location to determine if licensure disclosures are needed in compliance with 34 C.F.R. § 668.43(c)(3)(ii).

II. Definitions

A. Residence: The state in which the student has legal residence.

B. Location: The state in which the student is located while engaged in SSC educational activities or the physical location of the student while enrolled and taking courses at SSC.

C. Professional Licensure Programs: An academic program designed or advertised as meeting the educational requirements for initial professional licensure or certification requirements of a state licensing body.

D. Time of Initial Enrollment: The time of the student's initial enrollment into any SSC program that leads to professional licensure. Please note that this is separate and distinct from the time of the student's initial application to the institution.

III. Scope:

This policy applies to all prospective students and to students enrolled in programs leading to professional licensure or certification requirements at SSC. This policy does not affect a student's residence for the purposes of determining whether a student should receive in-state or out-of-state tuition.

IV. Responsible Offices:

The offices of the Vice President for Finance, Grants, and Enrollment and Vice President for Academic and Student Affairs will be responsible for the management and implementation of this policy.

V. Policy Statement:

SSC will use a student's location for the purpose of determining any required licensure disclosures in compliance with federal law.

VI. Procedures

A. In accordance with the U.S. Department of Education disclosure requirements, SSC records the location of prospective and current students. SSC uses a student's location to determine if licensure disclosures are required in compliance with 34 C.F.F. § 668.43(C)(3)(ii). SSC records a student's location and uses it to determine any applicable licensure disclosures in the following instances:

1. At the time the student applies for admission, or

2. At the time of initial enrollment in an academic program designed to lead to or advertised as leading to licensure required for employment in an occupation, and/or

3. When a student notifies SSC of a change in their academic program or major.

B. The location of each student is determined by the information provided by the student at the time of enrollment into the academic program. In most but not all cases, the location of a student will correspond to the student's' mailing address. Student location designations will remain in effect unless and until a student officially notifies SSC that their location has changed. All students participating in educational activities outside of Oklahoma must notify the college of their change in location and sign an attestation, if appropriate.

C. Students who are enrolled in programs that lead to licensure/certification and for which all courses in the first semester of the program are completed entirely on the Seminole, or Gordon Cooper Technology Center campuses are deemed to have Oklahoma as their location at the time of initial enrollment for the purposes of this policy.

D. Students who apply for programs that lead to licensure/certification and for which any course in the first semester is completed online may not enroll unless the program meets the requirements for licensure/certification in the students' location. Students who are located in states where the college's licensure/certification program is determined to not meet the licensure/certification requirements for the state may be able to enroll after completing an attestation, if appropriate. In those cases, the student must declare their intention to seek licensure in a state where the program has been determined to meet the state's licensure/certification requirements.

E. SSC will provide students with any required disclosures specific to the licensure/certification requirements for a particular academic program based on the Location provided by the student.
