Other Data Indicating Quality Relevant to Degree Program Major Field

Student Feedback on Instruction: Of the 1797 students who completed English classes, 839 participated in the Student Feedback Questionnaire. The Language Arts and Humanities average score for the "almost always applies" response was 71.97%.

Graduate Exit Survey: No relevant current data available.

CAAP Test: An average of CAAP test scores since 2006 shows that SSC students are above the national average in writing and reading. SSC students are only .9 of a percent below the national average in critical thinking despite not having data for 2011.

Community College Survey of Student Engagement: Sixty-two percent of SSC students responded often or very often to the student-faculty interaction of discussing grades or assignments with an instructor as compared to 50.1% for students in the cohort schools. All of the LAH faculty conference with their students in order to tailor their instruction based on students' needs. The diversity of our students' knowledge of English and the arts demands this interaction.

5. Recommendations and Other Relevant Items: Describe recommendations, new developments or initiatives pertaining to degree program.

STUDIO ART: For the Studio Art courses, the professors indicated that the students were rarely absent because they enjoyed coming to class, and the content of the course was learned repeatedly as the students progressed through the assigned projects. The students did comment, as they have for the past several years, that the art studio room was too small, especially late in the semesters when the amount of projects increases. The art studio faculty are hopeful that their recent requests for vacated rooms will be granted. The prison students very much appreciated a studio art class, and not just the same old lecture-styled course. As always, the students who came to class and did all of their work passed the class with good grades.

ART HISTORY / ART APPRECIATION: For the Art History and Art Appreciation courses, the same concept held true: the students who came to class regularly and completed all of their work passed the class. Some students stopped attending, but did not bother to drop the class, and thus earned an F for the semester. The Art Faculty commented that if we had an "instructor drop" process in place at the college, that this could have been used to prevent these students from receiving an F on their transcripts for the courses. Also, several students complained about the 30-year-old theater seats in the Art History room. Many of the seats are in very bad shape and need replacing.
