Other Data Indicating Quality Relevant to Degree Program Major Field

Student Feedback on Instruction: Approximately 104 students completed the survey and the average was 4.1 overall, with some responses to individual questions scoring much higher. In regards to the technology portion the overall average was approximately 4.3. With 4 as a "usually applies" and a 5 as "almost always applies".

Graduate Exit Survey: No relevant current data available.

Collegiate Assessment of Academic Proficiency (CAAP) Test: SSC students are slightly below or almost at the national average in writing skills, reading comprehension, critical thinking, and math. While science is slightly lower, it is only 1.4 from the national average. Criminal justice careers incorporate all areas depending on their chosen career path. For example, forensic scientists utilize a tremendous amount of math and science knowledge. Police officer use math in recreating auto accidents and all criminal justice career fields write reports used in court as evidence.

Community College Survey of Student Engagement: In reviewing the CCSSE survey SSC faculty are demonstrating success with fostering Student-Faculty Interaction with a 54.2 which was only 4.1 difference with Top Performing colleges nationally and well above other cohort colleges. Encouraging students to visit faculty members in their offices to review grades, provide tutoring, and general career/educational advise is proving to be an added asset to the success of SSC and our students.
