# Minutes SEMINOLE STATE COLLEGE BOARD OF REGENTS REGULAR MEETING March 27, 2025

#### I. Call to Order

The regular meeting of the Seminole State College Board of Regents was called to order at 1:00 p.m. in the Board Room of the Enoch Kelly Haney Center.

#### II. Roll Call of Members

Roll call was conducted. Regents present were: Marci Donaho, Teresa Burnett, Robyn Ready, Bryan Cain, and Curtis Morgan. Regent Franklin and Regent Pitts were absent.

#### **III. Introduction of Guests**

President Reynolds introduced administrators and staff present, including members of the Social Sciences Division. Jeffrey Christensen, Chair of the Social Sciences Division, introduced members of his division and highlighted their service and academic contributions to the College and community. Members of the Social Sciences Division present were: Christal Knowles, Marta Osby, Sam Rivera, Twila Kappele, and Dr. Steve Bolin. Special guests included Registrar Sheila Morris, Veterans Affairs Specialist Stacy Foster, and STEM faculty in support of emeritus consideration for Dr. Noble Jobe. Those attending from the STEM Division were Emily Carpenter, Wendy Rich and Dr. Deanna Miles.

#### IV. Minutes

There being no additions or corrections to the minutes of the Special Meeting held February 24, 2025, Regent Ready made a motion to approve the minutes as presented. Regent Cain seconded the motion. Roll call was as follows: Donaho, yes; Burnett, yes; Cain, yes; Ready, yes; Morgan, yes.

#### V. Communications to the Board

<u>Financial Report</u> – Vice President Melanie Rinehart presented a review of the College's revenue and expenses through February 28, 2025. She reported an increase of nearly 9% in revenue and a 10% decrease in expenses compared to the prior year. Compensation and benefits rose by 3%, and auxiliary functions reported a net revenue of \$1.4 million year-to-date.

One purchase over \$15,000 was reported for RobotLAB, Inc. in the amount of \$49,360, for use by the NASNTI grant to support the computer science program with AI language-coded robots.

Regent Donaho made a motion to approve the Financial Report and the reported purchase. Regent Cain seconded the motion. Roll call was as follows: Donaho, yes; Burnett, yes; Cain, yes; Ready, yes; Morgan, yes.

#### VI. Hearing of Delegations

#### VII. President's Report

President Reynolds presented campus updates through a PowerPoint presentation and oral report (see attached):

<u>Personnel Update:</u> Austin Vogel was appointed as the full-time Men's Head Basketball Coach. Sam Rivera announced retirement effective June 1. Mark Spencer and Mindy Stufflebean were also recognized in regard to their upcoming retirements.

<u>Student Recognition:</u> PLC student Melanie Long, a freshman from Yukon, reported on her experience at the Nigh Leadership Academy and was commended for her representation.

#### **Campus Activities:**

- PLC visited Black Wall Street and the OKC Bombing Memorial.
- Student Support Services program participants attended a Thunder game and career fair.
- A business advisory committee meeting was held with local business leaders.
- The library launched a young adult book donation initiative.
- "Battle at Bricktown" baseball event drew high attendance.
- Shawnee Educational Coalition meetings continued with positive media coverage.
- Read Across America participation included SSC athletes and staff reading to local elementary students.
- SSC hosted the Oklahoma Two-Year College Presidents' Assistants Network meeting.
- U.S. Congresswoman Stephanie Bice visited SSC and met with local leaders.
- Several events were hosted by SSC grant programs and student organizations.
- Ag Professor Wendy Rich participated in community outreach, including wildlife education and volunteerism.
- Faculty presented at the Oklahoma Learning Innovation Summit.
- SSC teams both reached the second round of basketball playoffs.
- SSC hosted approximately 900 students for the 51st Annual Interscholastic Meet.
- Oklahoma Governor Kevin Stitt visited campus and toured the Nursing Simulation Lab.

#### **EXEMPT STATUS FACT SHEET**

Pursuant to 85A O.S., §36, any individual or business entity that is not required to secure compensation under the requirements of the Administrative Workers' Compensation Act (AWCA) may execute an Affidavit of Exempt Status. Those who are unsure as to whether they may lawfully submit an Affidavit of Exempt Status should seek competent legal advice.

**Employee:** 85A O.S., §2(18): The definition of "employee" includes any person, including minors, in the service of an employer under any contract of hire or apprenticeship, written or oral, expressed or implied. It excludes those whose employment is casual and not in the course of the trade, business, profession, or occupation of his or her employer. Additional, specific exceptions may be found in 85A O.S. §2(18)(b).

**Independent Contractor:** The AWCA does not define "independent contractor." Oklahoma law considers an independent contractor to be one who engages to perform certain services for another, according to his or her own manner and method, free from control and direction of his or her contractor in all matters connected with the performance of the service, except as to the result or product of the work. Independent Contractors are not "employees" for purposes of the AWCA.

Below are statements to help you decide if you are an independent contractor. No one statement is controlling, and your status is based on all the facts in your situation.

- 1. The nature of the contract between you and the contractor. For example: Is there a written contract where you agree that you are an independent contractor? Are you a corporation or limited liability company? Do you maintain commercial general liability insurance or other business insurance?
- 2. The contractor exercises very little control over your work. For example: By the agreement, can the contractor exercise control on the details of the work or your independence? Do you exercise control over most of the details of the work? Do you create plans or specifications for the job? Do you set your own work hours?
- 3. You are engaged in a distinct occupation or business for others. For example: Do you work for companies or individuals other than the Contractor? Do you work for competitors of the Contractor? Does your business have a logo or uniform?
- 4. Your job is the kind of occupation where the work is usually performed by a specialist without supervision, and not under the direction of the contractor. For example: Does the Contractor supervise your work?
- Your occupation requires special skills, license, education or training.
- 6. The contractor does not supply the things needed to perform your job such as the tools and the place of work. For example: Do you supply any of the materials or tools for the work? Do you operate a vehicle owned by the contractor? Do you perform the work at your business or the contractor's business location or jobsite? Do you wear a uniform supplied by the contractor?
- 7. The length and duration of the job does not show that you are really an employee. For example: Is this a one-time job, or will you be doing this for the contractor regularly?
- 8. You are paid as a separate contractor, not as an employee. For example: Do you invoice the Contractor for your services? Are you paid by the job? Do you file a federal income tax return for your business? Do you expect to receive an IRS Form 1099 from the Contractor? Does the Contractor pay your expenses?
- 9. Your work is not the regular business of the employer. For example: Is your work customarily done in the Contractor's line of business or as part of the Contractor's daily work? Have you ever been an employee of the Contractor? Do you work with other people hired by the Contractor on the work you perform?
- 10. You do not consider yourself an employee of the contractor. For example: Will the Contractor withhold taxes or monies from your payment? Have you ever been an employee of the Contractor? Have you or your employees ever filed an insurance claim against the Contractor?

RE: Paralegal Associate of Applied Science Degree

I respectfully request that the Seminole State College Board of Regents consider approval of the addition of a Paralegal Associate of Applied Science Degree program within the Social Science division. If approved by our local board, the request will be submitted to the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education for their consideration.

This program will be designed to prepare students for a variety of career paths, including positions in private law offices; federal, state, and local government law-related offices; governmental agencies, banks, real estate firms, brokerage houses; and other institutions requiring legally trained employees.

The rationale for establishing paralegal program strongly align with the Mission of SSC to drive academic success by fostering the personal development of our students and cultivating them as lifelong learners within their chosen legal community. The program would focus on recruiting, engaging, and enriching students to become future leaders in this field.

We believe that SSC's commitment to beginning a Paralegal Program would enhance both enrollment and financial baselines by attracting new students while complementing and augmenting our existing majors. Furthermore, it would address a current void in south central and eastern Oklahoma by providing legal training and marketable skills at the community college level.

It's also worth noting that Paralegal is listed on Oklahoma's Top 100 Critical Occupations List with indications of increased need for trained professionals in this field over the next decade. According to that source, the median annual wage for employment as a Paralegal in 2022 was \$55,560. Nationally, there is an average of approximately 37,300 job openings projected each year.

We believe that starting this program at Seminole State College will help meet a need in our local and state workforce and add vibrancy to the economic development of our area.

# **Medical Laboratory Technology Program**

#### **General Information**

#### **Program Objective**

The objective of the Medical Laboratory Technology Program is to prepare students for immediate employment as a Medical Laboratory Technician. Upon completion of the program, students will receive an Associate in Applied Science in Medical Laboratory Technology and be eligible to take the ASCP Board of Certification MLT Exam.

ASCP certified Medical Laboratory Technicians may qualify to take the Medical Laboratory Scientist exam after completing a B.S. and two subsequent years of full-time work experience or by completing a B.S. in Medical Laboratory Science from National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences (NAACLS) accredited program.

#### **Program Location**

The Medical Laboratory Technology (MLT) Program is the result of a collaborative partnership between Seminole State College and Gordon Cooper Technology Center (GCTC). Students complete general education requirements and technical-occupational support requirements primarily on the SSC campus. MLT lecture /lab courses are completed at the Shawnee campus of GCTC. Practicum courses are completed at an assigned affiliate hospital.

#### **Program Accreditation**

Seminole State College's Medical Laboratory Technology Program is accredited by the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences (NAACLS). Questions may be directed to NAACLS, 5600 N. River Road, Suite 720, Rosemont, IL 60018-5119. Phone: 773-714-8886.

#### Majoring in Medical Laboratory Technology

Selecting medical laboratory technology as a major is open to all SSC students and can be accomplished through an advisor just like any other SSC major field of study. However, formal admission to the program is a more rigorous and competitive process as describe in the next section.
